PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

We are now into the final days of December and this is an ideal time to reflect on the first three months of the school year, and to set learning goals for the start of 2020. Teachers continue to share formative communications of student learning with parents about the core competencies, big ideas and curricular competencies and content in core subject areas. These regular communications provide clear reporting to parents on how students are doing in their schoolwork. Written progress reports will be coming home on February 7, 2020. This report card will provide parents with a more complete view of their child's behaviours for success and their learning and achievement in core subjects relative to widely held expectations for their age and grade. It will also communicate areas for improvement and goal setting for future learning (see below).







Ongoing Communications of Student Learning (OCSL) & Written Student Progress Report

f Communicating student learning with parents is the new (normal) method of reporting on how students are learning. Nanaimo Ladysmith Public Schools is a part of a provincial pilot on student assessment and reporting. Letter grades are no longer used and strength-based formative assessment practices are communicated throughout the school year, with a Written Progress Report sent home on February 7, 2020 and a Written Summative Report distributed on June 30, 2020. Teachers share with parents what the student knows- can do- and understands in relation to provincial learning standards.

The February Progress Report is a formative written report of student progress mid-year. It includes a Summary of Learning, a record of the ongoing communications of student learnings that have been completed, and a confirmation that all 3-core competencies (Communication, Thinking, and Personal & Social) have been shared with parents.

With OCSLs, teachers regularly share with parents through hardcopies or FreshGrade (digital) evidence of student learning and achievement in core subject areas such as Language Arts, Mathematics, Science and Social Studies. Students' work samples are accompanied by descriptive feedback comments from the teacher in terms of the curricular learning standards. Student voice is also included as students self-assess their own learning strengths and set goals for improvement. Competency scales have replaced letter grades for showing how each student is progressing in their grade. These proficiency scales include headings such as Emerging, Developing, Proficient and Extending to describe the knowledge, skills, processes and strategies demonstrated by each student during the school year.

Another important aspect of our reporting/communicating with parents is the Behaviours for Success comments, which are drawn from the new Career Planning curriculum. These student behaviours are directly linked to how each child approaches their learning and how they interact with others in a learning activity. The descriptors include 1) Self-Awareness, 2) Working with others (Collaboration and Communication), 3) Career Knowledge, 4) Career Planning.

WE Day in Vancouver - November 20, 2019 Thank you to **Mr. Watt** and **Mrs. Kuffler** for accompanying 13 McGirr students from our Social Justice leadership group to this important annual event on changing our communities and schools. Here are some highlights of selected speakers' powerful messages that parents may wish to reinforce with their own children. Many thanks to Mrs. Kuffler for recording these notes from November 20.

Lorna Rasmussen – She did not fit in, and did not trust others. As a child, she was teased and tried to bury her pain. She wrote stories about pain, from generalized and social anxiety with the potential for depression. She called the crisis line. Do not stay silent about mental illness and be ashamed. There is help out there. You deserve to be alright.

Giovanni Marsico - Dreamed of being a superhero and he was a target because of his high IQ. He was bullied for being so smart (made others look bad). He hated the word "gifted." He kept his love of superheroes a secret, and then discovered that the Xmen helped him embrace himself so he dreamed bigger. He now runs a company called Archangel Academy. His message is do not be afraid to stand out and be different. What makes you different? What is your superpower and how are you going to use it to change the world?

Laura Grizzlypaws - Indigenous people's history of Canada. Her parents and grandparents went to residential schools. They live on reserve land put aside for them and still have their culture, and customs. Although it is not her burden to carry, she is responsible for her own healing and well-being. We need unity and balance to each other and the ecosystem. Open our hearts and minds to the indigenous ways of being for the future. Live in balance.

Nav Bahati - Super fan of Toronto Raptors. Nav dealt with many racist comments. He could not get a job when he came to Canada in 1980s. He responded with positivity, by reaching out to someone who made nasty comment to him on twitter. He phoned him and the person apologized. Nav only accepted the apology if he and his family joined Nav and his family for dinner and a game. They are now friends for life. Others have responded with negativity, which makes them *no* better. The challenge is to stand up for people who are being discriminated against. Let them know they are not alone and respond with positivity.

Rick Hansen - At 15 years old, a car accident left him paralyzed. Rick started a movement to make the world more inclusive. He completed an ultra-marathon around the world on the journey of social change. Had to find superpower after his accident. It is not what superpower you have; it is what you do with it. Disability affects everyone - from a broken arm to long-term visual impairment. About ability – there are solutions created to make things more inclusive although many barriers remain in the world. Is your school accessible? Community? Whether it is local or global it applies to everyone. The world is much smaller and more connected now #everyoneeverywhere. No one is left behind.

Grade 7 Team Building & Giving Back-

On the evening of Thursday December 5^{th,} our grade 7 students will be in our gym from 6-9 p.m. completing a variety of leadership and team-building activities and exercises with their teachers **Mrs. Peace, Mrs. Carlson** and **Mrs. McDonald**. This will be followed the next day with the annual "giving back" morning in which groups of students will go to various businesses and organizations around the Nanaimo community with the purpose of volunteering their time for an important cause in order to make their neighbourhood and community better. We are grateful to each parent and guardian for volunteering to drive pods of students to and from various locations throughout the city.

Bake Sale Sponsored by the Social Justice/Student Leadership Clubs

Mr. Watt is organizing a bake sale with the student members of our social justice club with proceeds going to support local and global causes. The *McGirr Social Justice Club* members have voted to use half of the funds raised from the bake sale to go to KIDS International (a local non-profit based out of Nanaimo) who support the educational needs of children and families in Cambodia. The other half of the funds will go to a local initiative that has yet to be voted on, such as Loaves and Fishes or The Salvation Army.

Delicious home baked goods will available on Thursday December 19. This is the same day as the winter concert and items will be for sale at both recesses and before and after the afternoon (1:00p.m.) and evening (6:30 p.m.) shows.

Winter Concert: The concert is on Thursday December 19, 2019 with 50-minute performances at 1:00p.m. and 6:30 p.m. Students in grades <u>K-4 plus our Sr. & Jr. choirs</u> will perform. Tickets will be distributed this week, and a lottery will be drawn for extra tickets next week. For the 6:30 show parents are asked to bring their children at 6:10 to their exterior classroom door (if there is no outside door they may enter through the main door and go directly to their class).

Parents will pick up their children after the performance in their child's classroom. *Please make sure that you have the tickets with you for the correct performance. They will be collected at the door.* Due to the fire code and safety regulations, we cannot exceed the maximum number of people in the gymnasium. If parents or guardians show up without tickets (or the wrong show), they will be asked to wait until everyone with tickets has been seated. We appreciate your cooperation with this safety matter.

Recycling at McGirr

An important environmental message from student teacher, Ms. Megan Schlitz:

McGirr Elementary School has been working on the goal of conservation and environmental stewardship this year, which has led us to register in the **Return-It Schools** program. This program focuses on recycling properly, which we hope will combat the large amount of the waste we see in the garbage cans. We will have an interactive presentation from the Return-It Man and his Assistant to inform the whole school and ensure we are the bins properly.

Volunteers

Check with the teacher to ask him/her if volunteers are being requested in the class/school. 2. Inform the teacher of your availability and s/he will provide a specific time and day for you to volunteer. 3. Teachers inform parents of the exact tasks and roles they wish the parent to perform while in the class. 4. Sign in at the main office and wear a *Visitor's Pass* when entering the school. Please remember that volunteers must respect the privacy and confidentiality of all students and school staff they interact with during their visits to the classroom and school.

Inclement Weather & School Closure:

Inclement Weather- School Closure Procedures Due to Weather – If schools are closed due to snow, or any other weather-related problems, announcements will be made on local radio stations (WOLF 106.9 FM,WAVE 102.3 FM, and 91.7 COAST FM) by 7 a.m. on the day of the closure. Please do not call the radio station – tune in and listen for the announcements, which will be made on a regular basis. In addition, the district will post the information on the district's website, Twitter, Facebook and mobile app. Families may also receive a message through the School Messenger notification system via phone, email or text. Please keep in mind, however, that there may be situations where this is not always possible, for example, power outages or technical problems. The most reliable method is to listen to the local radio stations. FOR STUDENTS • Listen to the radio stations for announcements of school closures, as described above and on the mobile app.

RENTALS – All rental agreements will be cancelled on the day of a school closure. EXTRA CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES – In the event of a school closure day, all school activities will also be cancelled (e.g. School sporting events/excursions, PAC meetings etc.). Only the Superintendent/CEO of schools has the authority to close schools.

Punctuality and Readiness to Learn

This is a friendly reminder to all parents and guardians about the importance and value of having students <u>arrive</u> at school before the morning welcome bell at 8:28 a.m. We have noticed a pattern of several students often being dropped off late and entering the office *up to 20 minutes* after the morning bell at 8:30 a.m. When students start the day tardy and enter the classroom several minutes after the other students, it disrupts the teaching and learning environment. In addition, students miss valuable learning opportunities that set the tone for the day such as class discussions, reviewing lessons from the day before, discussing the 'shape of the day,' and going over established classroom routines. Time-management is a life skill that we all must learn and elementary school is the ideal place to learn this skill. Thank you for supporting your child's learning by helping them be ready to learn on time.
