Formative Assessment Conferences and Individual Education Plan (IEP) Meetings

In the past few weeks, we have been focused on communicating student progress with parents and guardians at McGirr. The formative assessment conferences are great opportunities to discuss your child's learning goals and progress with the teacher(s). These meetings are also set up by some staff to have student-lead conferences, in which students share their projects, notebooks, tests and assignments with parents through the lens of core competencies and communicating their own personal growth and learning. IEP meetings are required Ministry of Education and NLPS discussions regarding designated student's social-emotional, academic and communicative progress in terms of their specific learning goals and objectives relative to their development.

We know that children learn in multiple ways, at different rates, and that learning is a personal and social process. Thank you to teachers, staff and parents for your time and efforts during these weeks of inperson meetings about students' learning. The **first written progress report** goes home in early <u>February</u> <u>2020.</u> Regular ongoing communications of student learning (digital or hard copy) are sent home to parents during the school year to inform them of how their child is progressing in core subject areas. <u>McGirr Code of Conduct</u> We teach the Code of Conduct frequently when working with our students at McGirr. When students make negative choices and/or become involved in conflicts, staff often resolve issues with students as they occur. Occasionally, the principal or vice-principal will problem

solve with students in an effort to teach students positive moral and ethical decision-making, associated with the child's level of understanding and development. We believe that teaching children appropriate behaviours and ways to solve problems peacefully should be educative, preventative and restorative. Please review the snapshot page of our school Code of Conduct, which applies to all students, staff and parents in our school community.



McGirr Elementary School Code of Conduct 2019-2020

McGirr Elementary School strives to develop a safe, caring, inclusive, and welcoming school environment that promotes the rights and responsibilities of all who learn and work here.

Our Code of Conduct reflects;

- the values of the *Nanaimo Ladysmith Public Schools 2.10 Inclusion Policy* that is based on the principles of respect, acceptance, safety and equity. It further affirms that "a learning environment that reflects diversity, inclusivity and equity is essential in supporting the highest level of individual growth and achievement."
- the expectation that "that all students, staff, and members of our school communities will adhere to a code of conduct that is **educative**, **preventative** and **restorative** in practice and response"
- the purposes and intention of the BC Human Rights Code(8.1b) 2017

McGirr Elementary School's Code of Conduct expects that students will demonstrate socially responsible behaviours that reflect respect and safety at school and while attending a school function at any location at any time of day or day of week.

Acceptable conduct: refers to behaviour that help to make the school a safe, caring and inclusive environment. The school community works with students to help them with learning responsible choices, safe behaviour, problem solving, conflict resolution, respecting and restorative practices. Unacceptable conduct: refers to behaviour that interferes with the personal safety of others and the safe and orderly environment of the school, either person-to-person basis or through social media. Unacceptable conduct can take the form or bullying, harassment, intimidation, discrimination or illegal acts.

Consequences: to be equitable, consequences may vary from student to student where the misconduct appears to be similar. Intervention must be appropriate to the student's age, maturity, needs, exceptionalities, extenuating circumstances and the nature of previous intervention, taking in consideration of the needs of the school.

Restorative Practices: focus on creating conditions for students to learn self-discipline, fix mistakes through addressing the needs of those who have been harmed and returning to the group/class/school strengthened. Students are encouraged, as often as possible, to participate in the development of meaningful interventions through discussion or mediation.

Immunization consent packages for grade 6 students were sent home early in September. Students in grade 6 will be offered routine vaccines for Hepatitis B, Varicella and Human Papilloma in school-based clinics with the consent of a parent(s) or a representative. <u>Please ensure you sign and return these informed consents</u>. Kindergarten students will receive vision, dental and hearing screenings in November. **Screening is not diagnostic but rather a tool to identify children requiring further testing or follow up.** Please contact the local Health Unit at 250-755-3388 and ask to speak with a Public Health Nurse if you have any questions, or visit <u>www.immunizebc.ca</u> . Screening dates at McGirr are Kindergarten: **Thursday, November 28, 2019 9:00 a.m.** and Grade 6 Immunization: **Monday November 25, 2019 9:00 a.m.**

VISITING A CLASSROOM or Talking to Teachers

At McGirr, we want to assure that classrooms function to their capacity as a learning environment. We also must ensure the safety of students at school during school hours. We also like to make sure that we have good communication with all of our parents. If you have a message to give your child or are dropping off items such as homework or lunches, please check in at the office. We will make sure that your child receives the items. Please give messages/lunches to our secretary rather than disturb the classrooms. It is also a safety protocol not to enter the school without signing in.

- If you are visiting/volunteering in a class, please follow this routine:
- 1. Check in at the office, always sign the sign-in sheet and be sure to include all information.
- 2. If you are staying to assist in a class, you will be given a Visitors nametag (wearing this quickly identifies you as someone who belongs in our school).
- 3. When your visit is complete, please return your tag, and sign out on the sign-in sheet.
- 4. *All volunteers in schools must complete a Criminal Record Check. CRC forms are available at the district's website under www.sd68.bc.ca. They are valid for 5 years.

TRAFFIC & SAFETY REMINDERS

 $\mathbf W$ e are again reminding all parents of our parking lot concerns re: driver behaviour to help keep our students safe as they enter and leave our McGirr school grounds. Please do not park in either of the two (2) <u>Handicapped Parking Zone</u> spaces at any time. These marked parking spots are solely for our parents of mobility challenged students who require this space to exit and enter

their vehicle safely. Thank you in advance for your consideration. Students are reminded to dismount their scooters, skateboards and bicycles when on school district

property. Students must walk their vehicles on the school grounds, and wear a helmet whenever operating these wheeled forms of transportation.

Please remember that there is no parking in front of the school. If you are leaving your vehicle to come to the school to pick up your child or if you are waiting for someone you must park in the parking lot. The Drop off area is a designated area for the School Bus, Emergency Vehicles and School District vehicles only. We are very grateful to our traffic volunteer, Wendy Grubac, who keeps traffic moving smoothly and safely for our children.
